


Michael

But it was the middle of 2003 before we finally set finger to keyboard. Michael drafted the first chapter. Stanley was enthusiastic and wanted to know what happened next. Michael didn't know...

It took two and a half years to get the book into a form we were comfortable with and then started looking for an agent. Six months later the wonderful Marly Rusoff agreed to represent us. Not long after that, she sold the worldwide English rights to HarperCollins in a two-book contract. As our English friends would say, "we were gobsmacked!" We had always thought we would self-publish and distribute copies to three or four hundred of our closest friends.

Now, five years after setting out to write a book for fun, we are about to watch it go public.

We are looking forward to the launch and particularly to meeting old and new Twin City friends. Then we will visit several Midwestern centers and bookstores to sign books and meet crime-novel lovers. The Second Death of Goodluck Tinubu

In the second novel in the series, Detective Kubu faces another challenging crime, one that leads his own family into danger. The book is complete in draft form and is with our editors.

The mystery is built around events at a tourist camp – called Jackalberry Camp – on the Linyanti river in northern Botswana. We had planned a different location initially, but when we visited the area, we couldn't find the lush bird-friendly environment that we had written about. Our old friend, Peter Comley, who runs safaris out of Kasane in northern Botswana (<http://www.sgsafrica.com>) read our descriptions of the camp and immediately identified the location as the sort of environment one finds along parts of the Linyanti River.

When his partner, Salome Meyer, took us there, after a long, rough trip off the beaten track in an open Land Rover, we saw that Peter had been correct. The river worked its way lazily between reeded banks, birds were in abundance, as were crocodiles and hippos. We were stunned by how closely it resembled the imaginary location of our camp.

"Well," said Michael who occasionally tries to be clever, "okay, but where are the Jackalberry trees?" Salome looked pained.

"You're standing under one," she commented, pointing to a gorgeous, lush example spreading above us...

Quite a change from the Kalahari setting of the first book.
